A. N. Streltzov. *ARICIA CHINENSIS* MURRAY, 1874 NEWLY RECORDED SPECIES OF THE BUTTERFLIES (LEPIDOPTERA, LYCAENIDAE) FROM THE RUSSIAN FAR EAST. – Far Eastern Entomologist. 2000. N 91: 10.

The record of *Aricia chinensis* for Primorskii krai [1] is based on of A.I. Kurentzov's data [2], who mentioned one female from Middle Sikhote-Alin Range (Ternej district, 5.VIII 1935). The untypical coloration of the specimen was mentioned [2]. V.V. Dubatolov studied Kurentzov's collection and discovered that this specimen appeared to be a female of *Polyommatus tsvetajevi* Kurentzov, 1970. Thus, authentic data on the findings of *A. chinensis* in the Russian Far East were absent.

## Aricia chinensis Murray, 1874

MATERIAL. Russia: Blagoveshchensk, left-hand bank of Zeya River, 9.IX1999, 2 & (Streltzov). The butterflies flied in agricultural biotopes and visited blossoming plants.

DISTRIBUTION. A. chinensis, the East-Palaearctic steppe species, widely distributed in Northern, North-Eastern and Central China, Korea and Mongolia. In Russia it is known from South-Eastern Transbaicalia, vicinities of Ulan-Ude, Khakassia, Minusinsk's hollow, and Novosibirsk [3]. Here it is firstly recorded from Amurskaya oblast'.

NOTES. A. chinensis differs from the similar A. allous (Hubner, 1819) and Eumedonia eumedon (Esper, 1780) by strongly developed red-orange spots forming almost confluent band on a general brown background at the top of wings. On the underside of wings the orange spots are united in a broad band.
